Trip to the Shuttleworth Collection and Air Display

It's difficult to condense into a few words the diversity of our experiences on Sunday 6th September when about twenty U3A members made the coach trip to the Old Warden Aerodrome. We arrived in good time to tour around the site before the flying display – we were spoilt for choice as to which areas to visit. Eight hangars housed vintage cars and other vehicles, a collection of impressive aircraft including the world's oldest airworthy aeroplane, the Bleriot XI Monoplane, and other various related displays. A seventeen-piece Big Band played wartime numbers to add to the nostalgic atmosphere. Other parts of the site housed the UK's largest Bird of Prey Centre and Owl sanctuary and a large picturesque Regency Garden.

One of my highlights of the day was the opportunity to take a tour around the line of some of the aircraft involved in the later flying display. The depth of knowledge of my guide amazed me – she was able to describe the history, capability, airframe and engine of each aeroplane. I enjoyed being able to get close up to many of the aircraft so as to peer into the cockpit to see the array of instruments etc. Standing next to the short ladder attached to the Lysander, I wondered how WWII secret agents might have felt as they clambered down onto French soil.

A special treat was the flypast by the Lancaster bomber of the RAF Heritage Flight. The crowd fell completely silent as we were all asked to imagine that we were on an airfield in wartime, at dawn, waiting for the last plane to return safely from a night time mission. As we watched and listened to the throb of the famous Merlin engines we were all touched by the courage of those brave airmen. A very moving moment.

Around thirty aircraft in total took to the air in the show, flown by only those who had attained Test Pilot status. Their skills were astonishing, particularly the three Barnstormers who demonstrated stunts that included balloon bursting and limbo flying! Unfortunately we missed the opportunity to see the Edwardian aircraft flying; they were grounded due to gusty wind conditions – maybe sufficient reason David to justify a return trip sometime? Everyone seemed to really enjoy the day. Many thanks David – we appreciated your hard work in planning and organising such a worthwhile trip.
