## 0844 AND 0845 TELEPHONE NUMBERS IN THE NHS

The Department of Health has a nationwide consultation out (to 31<sup>st</sup> March) on the use of 0844 and 0845 telephone numbers in the NHS. The use of 09 numbers was banned several years ago, and the Government is now considering banning the use of 084 numbers too. This is an opportunity to "have your say".

Our local hospitals and many GP practices use 0844 numbers which offer "enhanced facilities" – ie an automatic switchboard from which you press 1, 2, 3 or whatever for the service you need. It costs us more to phone 0844 numbers than it does to phone 01 or the recently available 03 numbers, and of course we pay all the time we are in the queue and also when they tell us they are very busy and ask us to ring back later. The hospital or GP practice also has to pay a sum to their service provider.

The Government believes that people should not be charged more than the cost of a local rate call (ie 01) to access NHS services. The consultation is about whether you agree with that, and what are the alternatives – 01 or 03.

03 numbers offer "enhanced facilities" the same as 0844 numbers but cost the same to the caller as 01 (including "free" via your internet phone package), but the hospital or GP practice has to pay a sum to their service provider. At present the hospital or GP practice can enter into an arrangement with their provider to share the "profits" and so get back some of the costs, but with 03 numbers that is not allowed.

The consultation booklet is available in GP surgeries and online at: [www.dh.gov.uk/en/consultations/liveconsultations/index.htm](http://www.dh.gov.uk/en/consultations/liveconsultations/index.htm) - or you can just key in Department of Health consultations and follow the links from there. I've not tested the availability in GP surgeries.

The consultation booklet is short and easy to read, and there is a form (Annex A) for your answers – just 3 questions and space for comments – and you don't even have to give your name and address. The email address for replies is [084consultation@dh.gsi.gov.uk](mailto:084consultation@dh.gsi.gov.uk). This is our opportunity to make our views known to the Government.
